## The Homestead Exemption Tax Credit

The Homestead Exemption for 2015-2016 is \$36,900. To qualify for the Homestead Exemption a property owner must:

- Be 65 years or older
- Own and Occupy the property as your primary residence prior to January

Kentucky's Constitution allows property owners who are 65 or older to receive the Homestead Exemption on their primary residence. If you are eligible to receive the Homestead Exemption, the exemption amount is subtracted from your property's assessed value, reducing your property tax liability.

Only one exemption (Homestead or Disability) is allowed per household. Those who currently receive the exemption need not reapply. You can receive the Homestead Exemption on residential or commercial property as long as you own and occupy the property. If you have an exemption and sell your property, please contact the PVA Homestead Department at (502) 574-6380 option 3.

KRS 132.810(2) (h) provides, "When title to property which is exempted, either in whole or in part, under the homestead exemption is transferred, the owner, administrator, executor, trustee, guardian, conservator, curator or agent shall report such transfer to The Property Valuation Administrator."

The exemption will apply to property owned and occupied as the primary residence as of January 1 of the application year. Property owners are eligible to receive the Homestead exemption in the year of their 65th birthday.

## **Preventing Mosquitoes from Breeding**

Mosquitoes lay up to 250 eggs at a time in still water, which will hatch in 7 to 15 days. During the off season, mosquitoes can lay dormant for up to one year.

If standing water is eliminated weekly, many mosquitoes will be kept from breeding in the first place. So if you are anti-mosquito, then start by getting rid of these breeding grounds in your yard.

# Ways you can help eliminate mosquito breeding grounds:

- Dispose of old tires, buckets, ceramic pots and other containers in your yard that may collect water.
- Fill in tree rot holes and hollow stumps that hold water.
- Drill holes into the bottom of tire swings.
- At least once per week, empty standing water from containers, including birdfeeders, on your property.
- Drill holes in the bottom of recycling containers that are left outdoors. Drainage holes in the sides of containers allow sufficient water to collect in which mosquitoes may breed.
- Clean clogged roof gutters, particularly if the leaves from surrounding trees have a tendency to plug up the drains. Flooded roof gutters are easily overlooked but can produce hundreds of mosquitoes each season.
- ♦ Turn over plastic wading pools when not in use.
- ◆ Turn over wheelbarrows when not in use.
- Store boats covered or upside down, or remove rainwater weekly.
- Aerate ornamental pools or stock them with fish.
   Water gardens are fashionable but become major mosquito producers if they are allowed to stagnate.
- Clean and chlorinate swimming pools that are not being used. A swimming pool that is left for a month can produce enough mosquitoes to infest an entire neighborhood. Be aware that mosquitoes may also breed in the water that collects on swimming pool covers
- Keep drains, ditches and culverts free of grass clippings, weeds and trash so water will drain properly.

Fill in low areas on your property to eliminate standing water. Ponds or streams where fish are present or the water is disturbed by current or wave action do not produce many mosquitoes; standing water is more of a breeding area. So if you have mosquitoes, the standing water in your backyard has got to go.

This will be the start of your anti-mosquito campaign!

Next step...effective outdoor mosquito control that can help you enjoy season-long protection from the dangers of mosquitoes.

# May Message from Police Chief Steve Griffin

It's definitely spring time in Hurstbourne Acres. The sun is shining, the birds are chirping, and the smell of fresh flowers and mown grass is in the air. Often times however, our peaceful days are interrupted by unwanted phone calls from telemarketers, solicitors, and scam artists. At best these callers are a nuisance but they can also lead to significant trouble if you inadvertently give some information to these callers that they use to your detriment.

There is however, an easy way that you can block the majority of these calls. The National Do Not Call Registry was implemented by the FCC to address these unwanted calls and you can register your home phone number and/or cell phone number. The process is very easy and you can register by phone or via the internet.

- To register via the internet, go to www.donotcall.gov
- To register by phone, call 1-800-382-1222 (voice) or 1-866-290-4236 (TTY). You must call from the phone number you wish to register.

Once you have registered, telemarketers must remove your phone number from their call lists within 31 days. Your phone number will remain on the No Call Registry until you remove them so there is no need to re-register.

Please contact the Hurstbourne Acres Police Department if you have any problems with this process or if you have any questions. We will be happy to assist you in getting registered.

### **COMMITTEE REPORTS**

## **Parks**

Commissioner Eskridge declared the Easter Egg Hunt as a success with a good turnout, good weather and under budget. This Saturday is the Brightside cleanup. The meeting location is Hurstbourne Parkway and Taylorsville Rd at 10:00 am. The retree process and contest continues with the current number of entries at 30. Finally, he displayed an example of the new yard sale signs that were recently purchased.

## Sanitation

Commissioner McAllister reported that the contract with Eco-Tech can either be renewed for another year at no change in cost or rebid. After a discussion, the Commission approved a renewal of the existing contract.

Regarding the fence ordinance that was revised in 2015,

Commissioner McAllister recommended that all portions of the original and amended ordinance be incorporated.

The current ordinance only includes that part of Ordinance 7, Series 2002 that was amended.

The logs at the end of Blowing Tree have still not been removed. Mayor Fore said he would again check with the construction foreman of the new apartments being built off of Bunsen Way to see if they will assist.

Resident Marty Dunn also mentioned that a large piece of debris from the construction process is stuck high in a tree on Blowing Tree that needs to be removed. Finally, there has been no further word from the owners of the Camden Meadows Apartments regarding the sidewalk project.

#### Roads

Commissioner Nichols reported that new street signs should be installed within the next 3 weeks, weather permitting. The Park signs should also be installed within the next 3 weeks. Commissioner Eskridge advised that there is room in the park shed for the old street signs until the surplus property process is done. Commissioner Nichols mentioned that she is still gathering information for the replacement of the City entrance signs with no time frame for completion. (cont.)

#### Roads (cont.)

Finally, she stated that as a result of someone's party in the city park the week of the Easter Egg Hunt, some broken glass from a bottle was found in the gazebo. All of that debris was subsequently cleaned up by a concerned resident(s).

#### **Police**

Commissioner Renninger reported that she is seeking a grant to purchase personal body cameras for the officers. In other news, our Police Department is working on a handgun safety workshop for residents. As an ethics reminder, some new businesses might offer a commissioner or other city employees a discount on food or even a free meal. The response should be 'thanks, but no thanks'. Finally, the 'see something, say something' program in the City is working. More and more residents call due to the information provided by Chief Griffin in the City newsletter.

## **Audit**

Mayor Fore received the final audit for the fiscal year from July 1, 2014 to June 30, 2015. The report was 'clean'. A copy of the audit was forwarded to the appropriate state department in Frankfort. This will allow our City to continue to receive the municipal road aid funds.

## **Fence Permit Application**

The City received a fence permit application from the owner of the property at 1804 Addington Ave. After a discussion, Commissioner McAllister, who has already talked with the owner, pointed out that part of the plan is not in compliance with the ordinance. Mayor Fore deferred approval until Commissioner McAllister can further explain the requirements of the ordinance to the owner and get the plan changed accordingly.

#### First Reading of Ad Valorem Ordinance

Mayor Fore completed the first reading of Ordinance #2, Series 2016, establishing the tax rate on all real and personal property in the City of Hurstbourne Acres, Kentucky for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2016 through June 30, 2017.

## First Reading of Budget Ordinance

Mayor Fore completed the first reading of Ordinance #3, Series 2016, establishing the budget for the City of Hurstbourne Acres, Kentucky for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2016 through June 30, 2017.

#### Miscellaneous

Resident Brent Hardin reminded everyone about the impending mosquito season. Commissioner Eskridge offered to include information in the Parks section of the newsletter about how residents can help reduce the mosquito problem in our area.

There being no further business or discussion, the meeting was adjourned.
