It is time to Spring Forward!

Daylight saving time begins Sunday, March 13, 2022, at 2 a.m. and that means it is time to change our clocks. It also means it is time to check our smoke detectors. If you have an older model that takes a battery, be sure to replace the battery. Test it to make sure it is in proper working order. If not, you will need to replace it.

If your detectors have the 10-year lithium battery, then check to see when it was manufactured to make sure it does not need to be replaced. The price to replace a working smoke detector is around \$20. That is a small price to pay for peace of mind. You can purchase a smoke detector at any hardware store, a big box store or even your local grocery store.

Also, all taxes will be due to the IRS on Monday, April 18, 2022. Avoid a penalty and get your taxes in on time.

All Hurstbourne Acres Commissioners and the Mayor are up for reelection Tuesday, November 8, 2022. If you would like to run, you must file a petition to run by June 7, 2022, at 4 pm. Commissioner Nichols made a motion to accept the minutes as published. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Renninger and carried unopposed.

Treasurer's Report

Treasurer John Bloomer outlined the January report. Commissioner Renninger made a motion to accept. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Nichols which carried unanimously. Treasurer John Bloomer also advised that he is now bonded as of February 1.

Attorney's Report

Attorney Baker confirmed that our City won the sidewalk case against the Meadows Apartments. She advised that the next step will be to have the value of the land on which the sidewalk will be built reevaluated.

Public Comment

There was no reply to Mayor McAllister's request for public comment from those that had joined the meeting.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

<u>Park</u>

Commissioner Eskridge advised that he has received 2 bids for tree removal in the Park, one for \$3000 and another for \$2550. After a vote, he was instructed to accept the lower bid from Jim Carey Tree Removal and Landscaping.

Lastly, he suggested that the City adopt newsletter etiquette guidelines. The Commission agreed to consider suggestions, a list of which he said was previously e-mailed to each commissioner and Attorney Baker. Not all commissioners said that they received it, so he went over the document during the meeting and will resend for review. Commissioner Eskridge also asked about whether businesses should be allowed to advertise in the city newsletter.

Sanitation

Commissioner Bohnenkamp reported that she has noticed a lot of trash along Blowing Tree

Road, mostly on the non-city side of the street. Mayor McAllister suggested that the owners of the property where the trash is accumulating be contacted to ask to have their side of Blowing Tree Road cleaned up. The Mayor said he will provide Commissioner Bohnenkamp with the contact information. She also wanted to remind everyone to contact EcoTech if they have any large items to be picked up and to prepare those items appropriately.

Roads

Commissioner Nichols said the trees and bushes at the city entrance sign on Bunsen Parkway have been removed as needed and was very satisfied with the job done. Regarding the *yield on left* sign to be installed on Stony Brook Drive, across from Blowing Tree Road, she called '311' over a month ago. She has not heard back.

Police

Commissioner Renninger mentioned that another business in the Taylorhurst Shopping Center has permanently closed. There are now several empty spots in Taylorhurst.

There being no further business or discussion, the meeting was adjourned.
